



VOTING WHILE INCARCERATED

Some Californians incarcerated in Los Angeles County Jails are still eligible to vote.

★ **YOU ARE ELIGIBLE TO VOTE IF YOU ARE:**

- 18 years of age or older;
- a citizen of the United States;
- awaiting or on trial for a crime but not convicted;
- serving time for a misdemeanor conviction;
- in jail as a condition of probation.
- on “mandatory supervision” or “post release community supervision.”

★ **YOU ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO VOTE IF YOU ARE:**

- serving time for a felony conviction;
- on parole for a felony conviction.

★ **VOTE IN THREE EASY STEPS**

1. Register to vote
2. Request a Vote-by-Mail ballot
3. Mark your ballot

★ **ELECTION MATERIALS ARE PROVIDED BY THE CUSTODY SUPPORT SERVICES (CSS)**

- Complete an Inmate Request form and write “Voter Registration and Vote by Mail application” where it says “other”
- Fill out the Voter Registration card and the Vote by Mail application. Return both to the CSS officer
- You must register to vote at least 15 days before Election Day
- When you receive your ballot, mark your choices and return to the CSS officer

Completed voter registration forms, Vote-by-Mail applications and Vote-by-Mail ballots will be transported in a secure manner to and from the Registrar’s office by a CSS officer or the US Postal Service.

★ **RELEASED FROM CUSTODY**

- Re-register to vote when you are released from custody.
- Registration forms are available at most public libraries and government offices or online at LAvote.net.
- If you are released before you receive your Vote-by-Mail ballot, go to a polling place on Election Day and request a Provisional Ballot.
